## About the Precise Custom Portal

The Precise Custom Portal, is a lightweight, configurable portal application that provides access to various types of data from different applications.

The Precise Custom Portal features a Web-based view. It is highly customizable and extensible, allowing you to build a dashboard for each user or each function within your organization. For example, you can build a dashboard for all the information that a system administrator or director of IT operations would need to constantly follow up on.

The Precise Custom Portal enables the following:

- Drives integration by displaying information from multiple data sources
- Enables rapid presentation layer development
- Provides extensible capabilities by professional services, partners and customers
- Customization
- Ease of installation, administration, and use

## Components of the Precise Custom Portal

The Precise Custom Portal is installed as part of the Precise suite. It is based on the Liferay Portal infrastructure.

## How the Precise Custom Portal works

The Precise Custom Portal is a Web server portal that displays information from different data providers. The Precise Custom Portal communicates with the data provider through a Web service adapter (for example, Precise Web Service).

The following figure shows how the Precise Custom Portal interacts with the various Web service adapters.



Figure 1-1 Precise Custom Portal architecture




The Precise Custom Portal supports JSR 286 standards and runs on MS Internet Explorer.

You can configure the refresh rate to determine how often the information displayed is automatically refreshed.

The information displayed in the various portlets is determined by the parameters you select when you configure the portlet. For example, the information displayed in a Precise portlet is determined by the technology that you want to analyze, and by the settings you use to define how you want to view the information (such as a table or bar chart).

## About the Main menu

The Main menu (click  after the Welcome message) allows access to most of the main features of the Precise Custom Portal.

The following table describes the functionality of each of the Main menu commands of the Precise Custom Portal.

	Manage Pages	Manage Pages lets you change the theme of an individual page or set the theme for a number of pages at once. A page can inherit the look and feel of the topmost page in the tree, or it can have its own individual look and feel. You can also import and export themes. (Admin rights)
Log Out		Log Out lets you log out of the Precise Custom Portal.

## About the Add menu

The Add menu (click  after Add) allows access to the most frequently used Add features of the Precise Custom Portal.

The following table describes the functionality of each of the Add menu commands of the Precise Custom Portal.

Command Name	Description
Portlet	Starts the process of adding a new portlet to the screen.
Page	Starts the process of adding a new page to the screen.
Time Frame	Starts the process of adding a Time Frame portlet to the screen.
Import From Precise	Starts the process of importing a portlet with information from Precise.

## About the configuration process

You can configure the Precise Custom Portal. You can decide which type of information is critical for you to see first when you analyze your system's performance. Based on your requirements, you determine which portlets to add to the dashboard, how you want the information displayed (for example, table or chart), and how you want the portlet to look.

## About the Portlet toolbar

Use the Portlet toolbar to modify and configure the information displayed in a portlet.

The following table describes the functionality of the portlet toolbar.

Table 2-1 Portlet toolbar







Icon	Function	Description
	Preferences	Click to modify what is displayed in the portlet by editing its preferences and parameters.
	Help	Click to access the help available for the portlet.
	Options	Click to show a drop-down menu with the following options: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ Look and Feel</li> <li>■ Configuration</li> </ul>
	Minimize	Click to minimize the portlet.
	Maximize	Click to expand the portlet.

## Adding a portlet to a page

The Add Portlet list contains the list of all the portlets you can add to the dashboard, arranged in logical categories. You choose the portlets that you want to display from the Add Portlet list. After you add a portlet to the page, you can move it to another position on the page by dragging it to that position.

You can also use the search feature to narrow down your search for a particular portlet name or set of portlets belonging to a particular category.

The list of portlets that are available to you depends upon your role and the permissions assigned to you.

To add portlets to a page

- 1 Open the Add Portlet list.
- 2 Click on the category containing the portlet that you want to add. Locate the portlet in the list and click **Add**. Continue adding as many portlets as you want. The portlets you selected are automatically added to the dashboard.
- 3 Close the Add Portlet list.
- 4 Click the Preferences icon and configure the portlet settings to determine what information will be displayed in the portlet.
- 5 Click **OK**.

To search for a specific portlet or set of portlets

- 1 In the Search portlets field in the Add Portlet dialog box, type the name of the portlet you are searching for. It is not necessary to type in the full name.

---

Note: Depending on the number of portlets that fit the search pattern, the search may take a few seconds before you receive a response to your query.

---

## Modifying a portlet's preference settings

You can modify the preference settings for a portlet to determine which information to display, and in what format to display it in.

To modify a portlet's preference settings

- 1 Click the Preferences icon in the portlet that you want to modify.
- 2 Modify the relevant fields to determine what information to display and how it is displayed.
- 3 Click **OK**.

## Removing a portlet from the dashboard

You can remove a portlet from the dashboard.

To remove a portlet from the dashboard

- 1 Click the Remove icon in the portlet that you want to delete.
- 2 On the confirmation window, click **OK**.

## Adding a page to the dashboard

You can add pages to your dashboard and determine the order in which they are displayed. After you've added the new page to the dashboard, you can determine the order that you want to display the pages in and determine how you want the information to be arranged on the page.

---

Note: Each page is assigned a unique identifier for the specific layout. This identifier is displayed in the ID field.

---

To add a page to the dashboard

- 1 Click **Add Page**.
- 2 Insert the name of the page in the text field.
- 3 Click **Save**.
- 4 Add the portlets that you want to display on the page.

To set the order in which the pages are displayed

- 1 Click the page tab and drag it to the left or right of another page tab to change the order in which the pages are displayed.

## Removing a page from the dashboard

You can remove a page from the dashboard.

To remove a page from the dashboard

- 1 Click the Delete icon (  ) on the tab of the page that you want to delete.
- 2 Click **OK** to remove the page from the dashboard.

## Changing the look and feel of a page

You can change the theme of an individual page or set the theme for a number of pages at once. A page can inherit the look and feel of the topmost page in the tree, or you can change the theme for an individual page to a different look and feel.

To change the theme of a page

- 1 On the Look and Feel tab in the Manage Pages dialog, do one of the following:
  - Click Pages, select the page you want to modify on the pages tree on the left, and then click the Look and Feel tab. On the Themes tab, select the theme you want to set the page to. This will change the look and feel of the selected page.
  - Click Look and Feel. On the Themes tab, select the theme you want to set the pages to. This will change the look and feel of all pages of the community.
- 2 Close the dialog box. The theme changes immediately.

## About the Control panel

The Control panel lets you control which content a user can view by setting up roles for different users and assigning users to different groups. Assigning users to specific groups helps you administer the dashboard more efficiently. You can then assign roles or permissions to a group of users, instead of assigning them to individual users.

The following types of administration pages provide different scopes of administration:

- **User administration:** Lets you configure the settings of the logged in user
- **Portal administration:** Lets you configure the highest level of administrative features. It provides access to all organization, roles, user groups, and user administration features in addition to portal settings and advanced content management
- **Server administration:** Lets you administrate server related settings and plugins installations

## Changing the time zone

The administrator can change the time zone for the entire company by editing the company profile.

Users can change their time zone setting on the My Account page in the Display settings entry.

To adjust the time zone settings for the entire company

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Settings**.  
In the Display Settings entry, you can set the time zone.
- 2 Click **Save**.

To adjust the time zone settings for an individual's account

- 1 Click **My Account**.
- 2 On the Display settings, in the Time Zone field, set the time zone by selecting a zone from the drop-down list.
- 3 Click **Save**.

## Setting up user profiles

A user can belong to more than one user group. Users inherit the roles and permissions of the group they are assigned to. The permissions and roles assigned to a user determine the tasks the user can perform.

Before a user signs into the dashboard, he is considered a guest. Guest users have their own set of default permissions which can be customized by administrators. After a user signs into the dashboard, he is considered a registered user. Permissions are assigned to registered users as follows:

- Directly to the user
- To a community that the user belongs to
- To an organization that the user belongs to
- To a role that is directly assigned to the user
- To a role assigned to a community that the user belongs to
- To a role assigned to an organization the user belongs to

To set up a new user profile

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Users**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Fill in the relevant information for the new user. You must enter a screen name, email address, first name, and last name.
- 4 Click **Save**.
- 5 Click **Password**.
- 6 Enter the password and confirm it.
- 7 Click **Save**.
- 8 Click **Back** to return to the Users

You can now add this user to an organization, community, and user group. You can also determine what the user will be allowed to do, such as, add permissions, or update and view information detailed information on the user's profile settings.

To edit an existing user's profile

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Users**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the user you want to edit.
- 3 Click **Edit**.
- 4 Make the required changes.
- 5 Click **Save**.

To delete a user profile

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Users**.
- 2 Search for the user that you want to remove.
- 3 Select the user.
- 4 Click **Disable**.
- 5 Click **OK**.
- 6 Use Advanced search to search for deactivated users (Active: No)



- 7 Select the required user and click **Delete**.

---

Note: You can also restore a deactivated user at this stage.

---

- 8 Click **OK** if you want to permanently delete the user.

## Setting up user groups

Organizing users in a group lets you assign roles to more than one user at a time, and helps you administer your organization more efficiently. Both roles and individual permissions can be assigned to user groups. Every user belonging to a user group will receive the roles or permissions of the user group.

To set up a new user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>User Groups**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Type in the name of the new group in the Name field.
- 4 Add a description.
- 5 Click **Save**.

To edit a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>User Groups**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the user group you want to edit.
- 3 Click **Edit**.
- 4 Make the required changes.
- 5 Click **Save**.

To delete a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>User Groups**.
- 2 In the table, select the group or groups that you want to delete.
- 3 Click **Delete**.
- 4 Click **OK**.

## Setting up Organizations

To add an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Organizations**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Insert the name of the Organization.
- 4 Click **Save**.

---

Note: If the Organization is part of a larger organization, first create the parent organization (select Regular Organization) and then create the sibling by adding its name, selecting Country, Region (if any), click Select, and selecting the parent organization.

---

To edit an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Organizations**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the organization you want to edit.
- 3 Click **Edit**.

- 4 Make the required changes.
- 5 Click **Save**.

To delete an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Organizations**.
- 2 Remove all Assigned Members from the relevant organization
  - a Click **Actions>Assign Members** on the row of the relevant organization.
  - b Clear the check marks in front of the members.
  - c Click **Update Associations**.
- 3 Click **Back**.
- 4 Select the organization that you want to delete
- 5 Click **Delete**.
- 6 Click **OK**.

## Creating Communities

To add an community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Communities**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Fill in the relevant information for the community, such as Name and Description.
- 4 Select the community type:

Open	Available for all users
Restricted	Available for a restricted group of users
Private	Only available for you
- 5 Mark the checkbox to make the community active
- 6 Optionally, add one or more tags.
- 7 Click **Save**.

To edit an community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Communities**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the community you want to edit.
- 3 Click **Edit**.
- 4 Make the required changes.
- 5 Click **Save**.

To delete an community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Communities**.
- 2 Select the community that you want to delete
- 3 Click **Delete**.
- 4 Click **OK**.

## Managing User Groups, Organizations, and Communities

To add a user to a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>User Groups**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the user group to which you want to add a user.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 On the Available tab, select the users that you want to add to the user group or search for the required user(s) and select them.
- 5 Click **Update Associations**.
- 6 Select the Back icon.

To delete a user from a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>User Groups**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the user group from which you want to delete a user.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 Clear the check box next to the users that you want to remove from the group.
- 5 Click **Update Associations**.
- 6 Select the Back icon.

To assign users to an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Organizations**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the organization to which you want to add a user.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 On the Available tab, select the users that you want to add to the organization or search for the required user(s) and select them.
- 5 Click **Update Associations**.
- 6 Select the Back icon.

To remove users from an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Organizations**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the organization from which you want to delete a user.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 Clear the check box next to the users that you want to remove from the organization.
- 5 Click **Update Associations**.
- 6 Select the Back icon.

To assign users, user groups, or organizations to a community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Communities**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the community to which you want to add a user, user group, or organization.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 Select the tab with the entity you want to take members from.
- 5 On the Available tab, select the users, user groups, or organizations that you want to add to the organization or search for the required user(s) and select them.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Select the Back icon.

To delete users, user groups, or organizations from a community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Communities**.
- 2 Click the Actions button on the row of the community from which you want to delete a user, user group, or organization.
- 3 Click **Assign Members**.
- 4 Select the tab with the entity you want to clear the selection of the members from.
- 5 Clear the check box next to the users, user groups, or organizations that you want to remove from the organization.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Select the Back icon.

## Configuring roles in the dashboard

Roles are a collection of permissions. The Roles mechanism lets you control which portlets a user can view. Roles can be assigned to a user, community, or organization. If a role is assigned to a community or organization, all users that are members of that entity receive the collection of permissions assigned to that role.

Begin by settings up roles, associating permissions with them, and assigning them to individual users or communities. Then you can assign a role or roles to a portlet to determine which users can access the information displayed in that portlet.

To set up a new role

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click **Add**, to add a new role.
- 3 In the Name field, enter a name that identifies the role.
- 4 Select the type (Regular, Community, Organization)
- 5 Click **Save**.

To remove a role from the dashboard

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role that you want to remove.
- 3 Click **Delete**.
- 4 Click **OK**.

To change a role's name

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role whose name you want to change.
- 3 Click **Edit**.
- 4 In the New Name field, enter a name that identifies the role.
- 5 Click **Save**.

## Managing roles

To assign permissions to a role for a user

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role for a user to which you want to assign permissions.

- 3 Click **Permissions**.
- 4 Set the permissions required by checking the relevant permissions.
- 5 Click **Submit**.
- 6 Click **Back**.

To assign permissions to a role for an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role for an organization to which you want to assign permissions.
- 3 Click **Permissions**.
- 4 Set the permissions required by checking the relevant permissions.
- 5 Click **Submit**.
- 6 Click **Back**.

To assign permissions to a role for a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role for a user group to which you want to assign permissions.
- 3 Click **Permissions**.
- 4 Set the permissions required by checking the relevant permissions.
- 5 Click **Submit**.
- 6 Click **Back**.

To assign permissions to a role for a guest user

---

Note: Per definition a guest user does not have permissions, but it is possible to change this as described in the following procedure.

---

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the role for a guest user to which you want to assign permissions.
- 3 Click **Define Permissions**.
- 4 Select either to Add Portlet Permissions or Add Portal Permissions
- 5 Set the permissions required by checking the relevant permissions.
- 6 Click **Save**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

To assign a role to an end user

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the end user that you want to assign a role to.
- 3 Click Assign Members
- 4 On the Users tab, click **Available**.
- 5 Select the users that you want to add the role to.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

To assign a role to a community

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the community that you want to assign a role to.

- 3 Click Assign Members
- 4 On the Communities tab, click **Available**.
- 5 Select the community that you want to add the role to.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

To assign a role to an organization

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the organization that you want to assign a role to.
- 3 Click Assign Members
- 4 On the Organizations tab, click **Available**.
- 5 Select the organization that you want to add the role to.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

To assign a role to a user group

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the user group that you want to assign a role to.
- 3 Click Assign Members
- 4 On the User Groups tab, click **Available**.
- 5 Select the user group that you want to add the role to.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

To delete a role from an entity

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Roles**.
- 2 Click the Actions button next to the entity from which you want to delete a role.
- 3 Click Assign Members
- 4 On the tab for the selected entity, click **Available**.
- 5 Clear the checkbox for the role that you want to delete.
- 6 Click **Update Associations**.
- 7 Click **Back**.

## Changing user passwords

The administrator can change a user's password by editing the user's profile.

Users can change their own individual password on the My Account page.

---

Note: If you want to receive email notification when you create a password for a new user or if you forget your password, verify that you install a SMTP server on the same machine the Precise Custom Dashboard is installed on.

---

To change another user's password

- 1 Log in to the Precise Custom Dashboard with administrator privileges.
- 2 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Users**.
- 3 Verify that the user is active. Search for the user whose password you want to change.

- 4 Click the **Actions** button.
- 5 Click **Edit**.
- 6 On the Password tab, type in the new password in the **Password** and **Enter Again** fields.
- 7 Check **Password Reset Required** if you want the system to prompt the user to reset the password automatically.
- 8 Click **Save**.

To change your own password

- 1 Log in to the Precise Custom Dashboard as the user whose password you want to change.
- 2 Click **My Account**.
- 3 On the Password tab, type in the new password in the **Password** and **Enter Again** fields.
- 4 Click **Save**.

## Setting up an enterprise profile

The enterprise profile contains the settings that will be used as default settings, each time a new user is added. For example, you can specify the enterprise name, which logo to display in the dashboard, set up the link the user will navigate to when clicking on Home or the logo, and the domain names that the server will recognize.

You can also change the time zone and language settings for the entire enterprise.

## Determining which portlets a user can view

The Portlets tab displays a list of all available portlets, indicates whether they are currently active or inactive, and shows which groups have permission to use each portlet. You can edit a portlet's properties, as follows:

- Determine whether to make the portlet active or inactive.
- Assign which roles that will have access to the selected portlet.

To edit a portlet's properties

- 1 Go to **Control Panel>Portal>Plugins Configuration**.
- 2 In the Plugins list, click the portlet that you want to edit.
- 3 In the text box, type the roles that you want to be associated with the selected portlet, one role per line. A user must belong to one of these roles to be able to add this portlet to a page.
- 4 Click **Save**.
- 5 Click **Back**.

## Deploying portlet packs

The files that configure and define portlet packs are packaged as WAR files. Use these WAR files to hot-deploy portlet packs in the Precise Custom Dashboard.

To hot-deploy a portlet or adapter

- 1 On **Control Panel>Server>Plugins installation**, click **Install More Portlets**.
- 2 Go to **Upload file**.
- 3 Browse for the WAR file.
- 4 Click **Deploy**. The hot-deploy process can take a number of seconds to complete.

## How to configure LDAP

Precise Custom Portal can integrate with Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP).

Once integrated with LDAP, Precise Custom Portal gets all users and groups from the LDAP and synchronizes them into its own database. Login passwords are authorized by LDAP, thus preventing the need to keep (and verify) the users' passwords within Precise Custom Portal. The following procedure describes how to configure LDAP.

To configure LDAP

- 1 Log in as Admin user to Custom Portal.
- 2 Go to **Control Panel>Settings>Authentication>LDAP**.
- 3 Under **Authentication**, mark **Enabled**.
- 4 Under **Default Values**, mark **Microsoft Active Directory Server**.
- 5 Under **Connection**, provide the parameters fields described in the following table:

Base Provider URL	<url_of_the_base_provider>
Base DN	<base_dn>
Principal	<domain_name>\<user_name>
Credentials	<password>

- 6 Under **Users**, provide the parameters as described in the following table:

Last Name	<last_name>

- 7 Under **Groups**, do not mark/configure anything.
- 8 Under Import/Export, mark or clear the parameters as described in the following table:

Import Enabled	Mark.
Import on Startup Enabled	mark.
Import Interval	Any selection as long as it is not grayed-out.
Export Enabled	Do not check this box.

- 9 Under **Password policy**, mark the "Use LDAP Password Policy" check box.

## About the Administration portlets

The Administration portlets provide administrative utilities that expand the functionality of the Precise Custom Dashboard.



The following portlets are available:

Adapter Settings	Lets you retrieve data from a specific source.
Portlet Upgrader	Lets you upgrade all portlets that are using the same Precise installation (source) to another Precise installation (destination).
Refresh Rate Setting	Lets you configure how often the information displayed in the dashboard is refreshed.

## About the Adapter Settings portlet

An adapter retrieves data from a specific data source. An adapter is defined by a unique identifier, called the Adapter Identifier, and the parameters that define where it should retrieve information from.

The Adapter Settings portlet lets you add adapters to and remove adapters from the dashboard framework, and define data sources for each adapter.

---

Note: Each data source represents an installation from which information is retrieved and displayed. An adapter can be associated with more than one data source.

---

Each data source has several fixed fields as well as fields that vary according to the adapter. For example:

- A DBAdapter represents an adapter for a database. Each data source defines a specific connection with a database.
- A Precise adapter represents the connection between the Precise Custom Dashboard and Precise.

The Precise adapter enables the user to communicate with different Precise installations from different versions (OOTB supporting v8, v8.x, v9, v9.6.x, v9.7.x, and v9.8.x).

Starting from v8.5, the AES encryption method was introduced in Precise. It is used as the default communication encryption method. For the adapter to communicate with the data source in the configuration process, the user will be prompted to copy the encryption key files from the Precise installation to the Precise Custom Portal installation.

The files reside in Precise under the `<precise_root>/infra/listener/etc/crypt` folder. The entire crypt folder should be copied to the Precise Custom Portal under the `<precise_root>/products/gui/website/asd_conf/data-sources-crypt/<data source server>-<data source port>` folder.

The following table describes the parameters you need to define for all types of adapters. Any additional fields that must be defined for a particular adapter are described in the help topics that are deployed with each adapter.

Table 3-1 Fixed Adapter Data Source fields

Field	Description
Name	A unique user-defined name that identifies the data source. This identifier is displayed in the Data Source list when you edit a portlet.
User Group	Indicates which user group has been granted permission to view information from this data source. This parameter is case-sensitive.  Note: If the Group parameter is left empty, every user can view information from this data source.

To add an adapter

- 1 In the Adapter Settings portlet, on the Adapter Identifier field, click **Add**.
- 2 In the Adapter Address field, type the address of the adapter Web service.

- 3 Click **OK**.

To edit an adapter

- 1 Select the adapter.
- 2 In the Adapter Address field, change the address of the adapter Web service.
- 3 Click **OK**.

To delete an adapter

- 1 In the Adapter Settings portlet, on the Adapter Identifier field, click **Remove**.
- 2 Click **OK**.

To add a data source

- 1 In the Adapter Settings portlet, from the Adapter Identifier list, select the Adapter that you want to add a data source to.
- 2 Click **Add Data Source**.
- 3 Enter the parameters that define the selected data source.
- 4 Click **OK**.

To edit a data source

- 1 In the Adapter Settings portlet, from the Adapter Identifier list, select the Adapter whose data source you want to edit.
- 2 In the Adapter Data Sources table, locate the data resource that you want to edit.
- 3 Click **Edit**.
- 4 Enter the parameters that define the selected data source.
- 5 Click **OK**.

To delete a data source

- 1 In the Adapter Settings portlet, from the Adapter Identifier list, select the Adapter whose data source you want to remove.
- 2 In the Adapter Data Sources table, locate the data resource that you want to remove.
- 3 Click **Remove**.

## Assigning permissions to adapters through user groups

Using the built-in security mechanism shipped with the Precise Custom Dashboard, you can control which data sources a user can retrieve information from. When you assign permissions to adapters the user can only see information from the data sources that he has been assigned to through his user group.

To assign permissions to an adapter

- 1 Create a user and associate the user with a user group. You also need to create the specific user group if it does not already exist.
- 2 In the Adapter Settings portlet, in the Adapter Identifier field, choose the adapter that you want to edit.
- 3 Do one of the following:
  - Edit an existing data source. Click **Edit**. In the User Group field, type the group that you want the data source to be associated with.
  - Add and define a new data source for the adapter. Click **Add Data Source**. Enter the parameters that define the selected data source. In the User Group field, type the group that you want the data source to be associated with.

## About the DBAdapter

The DBAdapter is the default adapter that is shipped with the Precise Custom Dashboard. This adapter lets you retrieve data from the database of your choice.

The SQL Server JDBC driver is installed automatically during the installation of the Precise Custom Dashboard. If you want to add additional drivers, copy the driver's jar file to the following folder:

```
<precise_root>\products\gui\website\webapps\DBAdapter\WEB-INF\lib\
```

To load the JDBC driver, you are required to restart of the Precise Web GUI service.

Note: Only a user with Administrator privileges can configure a database as a data source. This is done in the Adapter Settings portlet.

The Name and Group fields are fixed fields which must be defined for every type of adapter.

## About the Portlet Upgrader portlet

This portlet is located in the portlets tree under **admin**.

The portlet gives you the functionality to upgrade all portlets that are using the same Precise installation (source) to another Precise installation (destination).

The portlet upgrader in the Precise Custom Portal 9.8.0 supports the portlet upgrade from Precise v8.0 to v8.5, v8.5/v8.7 to v9.0, v9.0 to v9.6, v9.6 to v9.7, and v9.7 to v9.8 adapter type data sources. The upgrade process will convert the portlet's request and parameters to match the new data source.

If the conversion logic fails for a portlet, it will be aborted, logged, and the process will continue with the next portlet.

The logging output for the portlet upgrade process can be found in the

<precise\_root>\products\gui\website\logs\upgrade.log and upgrade-report.log files.

- 1 On the Refresh Rate Settings portlet toolbar, click the Edit Preferences icon.
- 2 In the Page refresh rate (minutes) field, type how often you want the information displayed on the page to be refreshed.
- 3 Click **Ok**.

To create a portlet with Import from Precise

- 1 Log in to the Precise Custom Portal.
- 2 Go to Add Portlet.
- 3 In the portlets tree under **Tools**, click **Add** after **Import from Precise**.
- 4 Select the data source.
- 5 Select the name that was used to create the Export to the Custom Portal Portlet view.

Note: The date and time stamp will help you choose the most recent view. The last 50 saves are available.

---

- 6 Click **Generate the Portlet**.
- 7 Click **Preferences** if you want to change the default configuration.

## About the Quick Note portlet

The Quick Note portlet lets you add your own note or comments to a portlet page.

## About the RSS portlet

The RSS portlet lets you display frequently updated Really Simple Syndication (RSS) content in a portlet. You subscribe to a feed by entering the feed's URL (one per line) and the number of entries per feed.

---

Note: It can take a while before content is displayed in this portlet.

---

## About the Retrieve from Database portlet

The Retrieve from Database portlet lets you query a database and display information from it. The Administrator must configure the database as a data source (in the Adapter Settings portlet) before you can send it a query.

In the Filter Data By field, enter the name of the data source that you want to retrieve data from and enter an SQL statement that is used to query the database and retrieve the information.

An SQL statement must begin with one of the following commands:

- Select
- With

You can also define the time frame for your retrieved information by entering an SQL statement.

The time frame has four parameters:

- !~timeFrameFromString~! - This parameter is the start time in yyyy/mm/dd hh:mm:ss a format
- !~timeFrameToString~! - This parameter is the end time in yyyy/mm/dd hh:mm:ss a format

Example To define a time frame that ends at 2010/01/16 02:20:45 am, enter the following query:

```
select * from A where time > '!~timeFrameToString~!'
```

- !~timeFrameFromLong~! - This parameter is the start time
- !~timeFrameToLong~! - This parameter is the end time

**Example** To define a time frame that ends at 123246486, enter the following query:

```
select * from A where time > '!~timeFrameToLong~!'
```

**Note:** In certain JDBC drivers, such as in Oracle JDBC, a query containing a count(\*) function, must be typed as follows:

```
select count(*) as c1 from table_1
```

**Note:** Adding a semi-colon (;) at the end of a query causes a query parse error in some JDBC drivers.

When you choose a display view for the information retrieved from the database, verify that you choose a view that is appropriate to the query you selected.

The following table describes how the information retrieved from a database is displayed.

Pie chart	Only numeric data is displayed. Non-numeric data is ignored. The first column of data is displayed as the name of the chart. Remaining numeric columns are displayed as values in the chart. Only the values in the first row are displayed in the pie chart.

## About the Time Frame portlet

The Time Frame portlet lets you decide the period of time that you want to analyze. The time frame you select, affects the time frame used by all portlets displayed on the same page.

---

Note: If you set up a different page to view additional portlets, it is recommended that you add the Time Frame portlet to the new page, and verify that you set it to the period of time that you want to display information on. If you don't add a Time Frame portlet to the page, the portlets on the page that are associated with the Time Frame portlet will automatically display information according to the data collected within the last 24 hours. This is also the default setting for all new time frames.

---



---

Note: If you delete a Time Frame portlet from a page, the portlets on the page will continue to display information according to the last settings you configured in the Time Frame portlet.

---

You can either choose to define the time interval that you want to analyze, or to focus your analysis on the last <n> minutes, hours, days, weeks or months, relative to your own local time.

The following table describes the time frame settings you can select.

From	Determines when the sampling period begins (date and time).
To	Determines when the sampling period ends (date and time).
Last	Lets you focus on the last <n> minutes, hours, days, weeks or months from the current time.

## Configuring the portlet


You can determine the design of the portlet and the user permissions.

To configure the portlet configuration

- 1 In the desired portlet, click the Options icon ()
- 2 From the drop-down menu, select the Look and Feel icon.
- 3 In the dialog box that appears, move between the tabs to determine the portlet layout.
- 4 To save changes, click **Save**.  
To revert to the default settings, click **Reset**.



To define the portlet's user permissions


- 1 In the desired portlet, click the Options icon ()
- 2 From the drop-down menu, select the Configuration icon.
- 3 In the dialog box that appears, use the Permissions tab to edit the user permissions.
- 4 To save changes, click **Submit**.

## Defining the portlet data preferences

You can determine which information to display in a portlet and in what format you want it to be displayed (such as a table, chart or gauge).

You can determine what information is displayed in a portlet and the portlet's width and height.

To define the portlet's preferences

- 1 In the Title area of the portlet, click on the existing title and rename it to a title that helps you remember what is displayed in the portlet.
- 2 Click the Preferences icon () to edit the portlet preferences.
- 3 Under Show fields, choose the information that you want to display in the portlet.
- 4 Under Filter data by, determine which information to display. Depending upon the Precise installation/data source selected you may be prompted to enter additional information.  
 If the Filter field supports the use of wildcard characters, use the percentage (%) character.
- 5 Under Properties, determine how you want the information displayed, as follows:

View data as	Determines whether data is displayed as a table or chart. If the data is of the same unit and type, it is displayed in the same chart.
Chart height	If you choose to display the data in a chart, determines the height of the chart, in pixels.
Position legend	If you choose to display the data in a chart, determines where to position the legend (options include top, bottom, left, or right of the chart).
Portlet height	Determines the height of the portlet, in pixels.
Portlet width	Determines the width of the portlet, in pixels.  The width of the portlet is also influenced by the layout of the page the portlet is displayed on.
Free Text	Allows you to enter text that is displayed at the top of the portlet. You can use this text to explain what the purpose of the portlet is, or give an overview of what is displayed in the portlet.

- 6 Click **OK**.

## Removing a portlet package from the Precise Custom Dashboard

The portlet package is saved as a compressed WAR file.

To remove a portlet package from the Precise Custom Portal

- 1 Delete the WAR file from the `<precise_root>\products\gui\website\webapps` folder.
- 2 Restart the Precise Custom Dashboard service and restart the browser.

## About the Business View portlet pack

At the heart of many large enterprises and Small-to-Medium-sized Businesses (SMBs) is the Information Technology (IT) department. The health of a company can be measured by the performance and availability of the very services provided by the IT department. Keeping track of how well these services are provided is a difficult task for IT managers and business users because they each measure the same parameters in different terms. For example, IT administrators will analyze how a Web server, API call or SQL statement is functioning, but will find it hard to translate these metrics into terms that can be easily understood and interpreted by Business Managers, who are interested in application services, business processes and transactions, along with the operational status of a system.

Using the Business View portlet you can map a URL or Java API call to a business name or process that lets business stakeholders view application performance data in the context of their business, in terms that are meaningful to them.

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## About baselines

Baselines are used to identify problematic conditions by enabling you to compare performance metrics of data entities to their 'normal' or 'typical' values. Baselines let you compare the past activity of an entity with its current activity.

The baselines used by the Business View portlets are derived from Precise baselines and can be configured in Precise AdminPoint. By default, the baseline is calculated once a week. In AdminPoint, you can configure the following for the Calculate baseline process:

- Baseline calculation scheduling.
- The time range over which the baseline is calculated.

For example, if you decide to run the baseline calculation process every Monday at lunchtime during the past four weeks, the baseline will be calculated as follows:

- response time of page run on Mondays during lunchtime / number of occurrences of Monday during the last 4 weeks

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Note: A baseline may not be displayed if an entity was not run within the time period for which the baseline was calculated. In this case, the data cannot be extrapolated.

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<b>abandonment rate</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the percentage of users that abandon the loading of the Web page before it completes downloading.
<b>action</b>	An operation that Alerts FocalPoint automatically performs when detecting a warning or critical status for a specific metric. According to the defined action, Alerts FocalPoint opens a message box, sends an email or SNMP trap, or executes a program.
<b>action item (manual)</b>	Some installation steps cannot be executed automatically by Precise Installer. The administrator is required to execute them manually. Action Items are presented (when necessary) at end of installation or product update.

<b>AppTier</b>	The abbreviation for an application tier in a Precise environment. An AppTier contains one or more instances of the same technology and purpose. Application tiers do not necessarily correspond to distinct physical servers: in many cases, the tiers are logical, with one server running multiple AppTiers or one AppTier spans a cluster of servers. A Precise environment may contain multiple AppTiers on the same technology. For example, you may group J2EE instances (JVMs) into a J2EE Presentation AppTier and a J2EE Business Logic AppTier. Segmenting application service time into the contribution of individual application tiers is helpful in identifying the source of performance problems. Analyzing the performance and behavior of each tier separately is crucial for isolating the root causes of performance problems.
<b>cabinet</b>	In Oracle, SQL Server, DB2, and Sybase, the highest logical level in the SQL workspace hierarchy. A cabinet contains folders and, within folders, statements.

<b>call path</b>	A subset of a stack trace including only those methods that have been instrumented.
<b>client cache</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the percentage of requests taken from the client cache (http status 304).
<b>client-side collection</b>	See <a href="#">Web client browser-side</a> .
<b>cluster</b>	A group of servers or instances that are configured to be treated as a single entity. In Oracle, all Oracle instances of the same Oracle database (RAC configuration) are treated as a cluster and presented in the Precise for Oracle UI as a Database. In J2EE, a group of JVMs that serve the same application can be defined as Cluster (even if they are not defined as a cluster in the application server configuration). All JVMs of the same cluster share the same configuration.
<b>collapsed access plan</b>	In SQL Server and Sybase, the access plan of a unique group of statements or batches that belong to the same collapsed statement or batch but have different access plans. This can differ due to the constants in the text of the original (not collapsed) statements. See also <a href="#">explained statement</a> . See also <a href="#">collapsed statement</a> .
<b>collapsed statement</b>	In Oracle, SQL Server, Sybase, and DB2, a statement whose constants are replaced with parameters. Each collapsed statement can have several access plans, according to the occurrences of its statements. See also <a href="#">collapsed access plan</a> .
<b>Collector</b>	The program that runs on the monitored server to collect performance information. Some technologies allow a single Collector (agent) to serve multiple instances running on the same server. Other technologies require a dedicated Collector per monitored instance. In most cases, it must be installed on the monitored server. Collectors for SAP, SQL Server, and Sybase may reside on a remote server. See also <a href="#">agent</a> .
<b>collector slice size</b>	In J2EE, the smallest unit of data presentation and storage. It can be configured as 30 seconds or five minutes. If SmartLink is configured, relevant Web and Microsoft .NET Collectors will report to SmartLink using the same collector slice size. Regardless of the defined collector slice size, the most granular slice size presented on both the Precise for Web UI and the Precise for Microsoft .NET UI will be 15 minute intervals.
<b>completion rate</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the percentage of users that completed the loading of a Web page.
<b>count</b>	The number of occurrences observed during a measurement interval.
<b>CPU time</b>	The average amount of time consumed by the operating system actively processing instructions on behalf of a running activity.
<b>critical status</b>	In Alerts, the status represented by a red bullet indicating that the value of the sampled metric has exceeded the near-critical and critical threshold values. See also <a href="#">metric</a> .
<b>Cross-AppTiers</b>	In Insight, Report Manager, and Alerts, a perspective that provides high-level information about the performance of all AppTiers in an environment, including operating system data. It provides a holistic view of the entire environment and helps understand how the AppTiers interact. See also <a href="#">AppTier</a> .
<b>current data</b>	In SmartLink, the end-to-end activity, detected by Precise over the last five minutes, including activities that are still in progress. In all databases products, a workspace that presents Current Sessions and the SQL statements that were executed including statements that are still in progress.
<b>custom</b>	Represents invocations of a type not specifically defined. See also <a href="#">work time</a> .
<b>customized metric</b>	In Alerts, a user-defined metric that measures site-specific parameters.
<b>drilldown</b>	Within Precise products and Insight SmartLink, the filtering of analyzed data by clicking a specific entity. Then, additional information about the selected entity is presented, plus a breakdown of its activity by another entity. For example, drilldown on a transaction and get an overtime graph of the selected transaction, plus a list of top users that executed the selected transaction.
<b>entry point</b>	Usually a top-level HTTP or EJB request. An entry point can originate when a user clicks in a browser or an E-commerce server invokes a remote EJB. J2EE makes a distinction between service request invocations and other invocations. The first HTTP or EJB invocation within a call path is designated as an entry point.

<b>environment</b>	<p>The highest Precise logical group. It may contain multiple AppTiers of various technologies that serve an application together. For example, a Payroll Production environment may contain all Web servers, application servers, transaction managers, databases, and servers that serve this application. Alternatively, it may contain any set of instances that form together an administrative group. Since Precise version 8.5, an instance can belong to more than one environment. Let's say a single Oracle database serves two different applications plus the DBA wants to associate this database with a group of other databases under his responsibility regardless of served applications. In this case the Oracle database will be associated to three different Precise environments.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">AppTier</a>.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">instance</a>.</p>
<b>ERP Extension</b>	<p>In Oracle, DB2, and SQL Server, an extension to the Collector that provides detailed information on the activities and resource consumption of packaged application components. It correlates the database information, and the packaged application information and lets you see users, transactions, reports, and other elements of ERP applications, such as Oracle Applications, SAP, PeopleSoft, and Siebel.</p>
<b>event</b>	<p>In Alerts, the occurrence of a sampling or progress. A sampling occurrence occurs every time a metric samples. A progress occurrence occurs when a metric's progress status is changed or when the investigated status reaches the end of the given investigation time. In AdminPoint, all occurrences reported by Precise agents, including informational events, warnings, and errors related to one of the agents. All events are shown in the Events view.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">metric</a>.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">progress</a>.</p>
<b>executions</b>	<p>In Oracle, SQL Server, DB2, and Sybase, the number of times a SQL statement was executed during the selected time frame. In SmartLink and SAP, the number of times a transaction was executed during the selected time frame.</p>
<b>explained statement</b>	<p>In Oracle, SQL Server, DB2, and Sybase, a statement whose access path (chosen by the RDBMS Optimizer) is clarified and translated into a visual display. Explained results include information on the objects referenced by the statement and the operations performed on these objects.</p>
<b>extended collection</b>	<p>In Oracle, a function that proactively specifies a future period during which Oracle activity data is collected and organized for subsequent analysis. Extended collections are an easy means to view collected information, assess application resource consumption, and identify bottlenecks that are inhibiting application performance and end-user productivity.</p>
<b>Federated Precise</b>	<p>Federated Precise is a version of Precise (starting with version 8.5) that can manage multiple Precise installations within unified StartPoint and AdminPoint screens, displaying and managing all environments, instances, and installations.</p>
<b>findings</b>	<p>A ranked list of top performance problems in the selected context. They are presented in Oracle, SQL Server, .NET, and J2EE. Each finding provides: a short explanation of the problem, detailed background information, and most important: one or more links to further investigate the problem and possibly get more granular findings on the selected context.</p>
<b>first byte time</b>	<p>In Web, a counter that keeps track of the time that it takes from the moment a new Web page is called until the first byte arrives back from the Web server.</p>
<b>FocalPoint</b>	<p>An agent that communicates with the Listeners installed on the monitored servers, receives data from the Collectors, periodically processes and stores this data in the PMDB, and serves UI requests.</p>
<b>folder</b>	<p>In SQL Server, Oracle, DB2, and Sybase, the intermediate logical level in the SQL workspace hierarchy. Folders are grouped into cabinets and contain SQL statements.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">cabinet</a>.</p>
<b>Framework Installer</b>	<p>The application that facilitates the installation of Precise framework components. It can be invoked from the installation DVD to install a new Precise deployment. It can also be invoked from an existing Precise deployment to install an additional framework node and attach it to the originating Precise deployment.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">Framework node</a>.</p>
<b>Framework node</b>	<p>A set of FocalPoint agents that are installed together and manages a set of monitored instances. The performance data of these instances will be loaded into a dedicated PMDB. A single Precise deployment may contain multiple framework nodes (using a separate PMDB for each node). An environment cannot span over multiple framework nodes.</p>

<b>garbage collection</b>	An automatic process in the Java runtime environment that periodically reclaims memory used by objects that are no longer referenced. The process can impact an application's performance while memory is being reclaimed. Java programmers may initiate garbage collection explicitly.
<b>group</b>	In Web, the identifier that is used to group other identifiers, such as sites or URLs.
<b>hint</b>	In Oracle, an instruction directed at the Oracle Optimizer that includes considerations for an execution plan. The Oracle Optimizer will build an execution plan based on the hint, ignoring its own set of considerations.
<b>hour group</b>	A unit that reflects the type and level of activity within the system at different times. By defining the times of the day that are peak and off-peak, or day and night, the performance analysis can be focused on those particular times of the day. If, for example, most performance problems occur within nighttime and weekend batches, it can be useful to focus only on them.
<b>InformPoint</b>	In Alerts, an agent that retrieves performance data from all installed Precise products, analyzes it, and sends an alert to the Alerts FocalPoint when the predefined thresholds are exceeded. See also <a href="#">agent</a> .
<b>Insight</b>	The Precise product family that facilitates the process of monitoring and correlating system performance. It consists of Insight. See also <a href="#">Report Manager</a> . See also <a href="#">FocalPoint</a> .
<b>Insight FocalPoint</b>	An agent that receives performance information from Insight Savvies, which monitor the environment. Insight FocalPoint then correlates, processes, and stores this information in a centralized location. The Insight performance history is stored in the PMDB. See also <a href="#">Savvy</a> . See also <a href="#">PMDB</a> .
<b>instance</b>	A monitored object of a specific technology. The following list specifies what constitutes an instance for the various supported technologies: J2EE - a Java Virtual Machine (JVM - a logical name set by the user), Microsoft .NET - a Common Language Runtime (CLR - a logical name set by the user), Oracle Applications - an Oracle Applications Form server, Oracle - an Oracle instance, SAP - a SAP system, SQL Server - an SQL instance, Sybase - a Sybase instance, Tuxedo - a Tuxedo domain, Web - a Web server, WebSphere MQ - an IBM WebSphere Queue Manager, DB2 - a DB2 non-partitioned database or a DB2 database partition. During installation, the instance is associated with one AppTier and environment. An Instance can be moved to a different environment or associated with multiple environments without re-installation nor losing historical data. See also <a href="#">environment</a> .
<b>instance statistics</b>	See <a href="#">performance counter</a> .
<b>instance/database changes</b>	In SQL Server and Oracle, the part of the Collect Schema Changes process that captures instance definition changes and database option changes and saves them in the PMDB.
<b>instrumentation</b>	The process of inserting fault-tolerant recording hooks in Java byte code, .NET MSIL, HTML pages, or other monitored components, resulting in the capture of performance metrics. In J2EE, a mechanism that enables collecting performance information when an application is executed. The process involves inserting special fault-tolerant recording hooks into application class objects. In WEB, the insertion of recording hooks into HTML pages can either be in memory (Dynamic Instrumentation) or file-based (Static Instrumentation).
<b>instrumentation context</b>	See <a href="#">invocation context</a> .
<b>internal invocation</b>	The process of invoking a request from an HTTP request (Servlet or JSP) or an EJB. J2EE displays an internal invocation like any other invocation.
<b>invocation</b>	An execution of a J2EE entity (a Servlet, EJB, SQL Statement, method, and so on). When mentioned in plural (Invocations), means the amount of times that the entity was executed.
<b>invocation context</b>	The context within which a method is invoked. For example, if Method A is invoked both from Method B and from Method C, there will be two different invocation contexts for the performance metrics collected for Method A, one for when it is invoked from Method B and one for when it is invoked from Method C. See also <a href="#">call path</a> and <a href="#">instrumentation context</a> .
<b>JRE (Java Runtime Environment)</b>	As the runtime part of the Java software, the combination of the components that enable the execution of a Java program: a Java virtual machine, the core class libraries, and the files that form the Java platform.



<b>JSP (Java Server Page)</b>	An HTML page with special tags for Java scripting. An application server processes the tags and generates a Servlet.
<b>JVM (Java Virtual Machine)</b>	An instance of a JRE that executes Java programs. A server-side Java application server is itself a Java program that runs inside a JVM. Servlets, JSPs and EJBs are Java programs (applications) that run within the application server's JVM. J2EE monitors the JVM running the application server and the server-side Java applications within the application server.
<b>JVM Heap Memory key metric</b>	The amount of real computer memory that is allocated to the JVM for executing Java programs.  In Alerts, a parameter that monitors a very important performance aspect. The status of the Oracle instance (up/down), for example, is crucial for system performance. If the instance is down, this is the first problem that needs to be solved. Marking a metric as key metric ensures that a critical alert raised for this metric receives top priority by the person that is responsible to handle alerts at any time. It can also help determine which alert to handle first in case of multiple alerts. In Alerts, key metrics are always displayed at the top of a metric table when it is sorted by alerts so that they get immediate attention.
<b>Listener</b>	The agent that facilitates the communication between the various Precise agents across different servers must be installed on every server where Collectors or FocalPoint agents are installed. The Listener allows communication with all other agents installed on the monitored server, while only the Precise Listener port is known by other servers.
<b>login name</b>	In SQL Server and Sybase, the session identifier that represents the credential used to connect to the database. When an ERP extension is installed, the user name of the packaged application's client overrides the login name. For example, when SAP extension is installed, the SAP user name overrides the login name.
<b>machine</b>	A session identifier. A machine as sampled, for example, by the SQL Server Collector is the identification of the machine where the client process executes. Machine is also sampled by Oracle, DB2 and Sybase. In Insight terminology Machine is called Client machine.
<b>Main framework node</b>	A main framework node is the single point for login and also serves as the Precise FocalPoint for the entire deployment.
<b>major collection count</b>	Number of estimated major garbage collection events that occurred during the last J2EE collector slice. A major garbage collection can stop the application while JVM heap memory is being reclaimed. See also <a href="#">garbage collection</a> .
<b>major garbage collection time</b>	Percentage of time spent by the JVM executing major garbage collection events during the displayed interval. See also <a href="#">garbage collection</a> .
<b>MBean</b>	A Java object that represents a manageable resource. In J2EE, MBeans, or Managed Beans, are used for application server metrics.
<b>memory logger interval</b>	The interval at which the J2EE Collector gathers JVM heap memory data. All snapshots of the memory logger's data collected according to the memory logger interval are summarized with counters in the current aggregation interval. The memory logger interval's time span is typically a small fraction of the aggregation interval.
<b>metric</b>	In Alerts, a query that helps measure performance in the environment. Three types of metrics are available: System metrics relate to the internal resources, operations, and objects of the monitored infrastructure; application metrics reflect the way the applications perform; user-defined metrics can be customized to specifically relate to a site. When a metric's value exceeds one of the defined thresholds, its status changes to near-critical (yellow bullet) or critical (red bullet). See also <a href="#">key metric</a> .
<b>metric set</b>	In Alerts, a unit that groups metrics that measure related performance aspects. The following metric sets exist:  Status: includes metrics that alert to functional problems related to the instance. Performance: includes metrics that alert to performance problems related to the instance. Load: includes metrics that alert to instance-related load problems that may later cause errors or crashes. Service: includes metrics that alert to instance-related SLA breaches. The metrics in this set are sampled by Insight. Performance Trending: includes metrics that alert to potential future performance problems. The metrics in this set are sampled by Report Manager.

	<p>Load Trending: includes metrics that alert to potential future load problems. The metrics in this set are sampled by Report Manager.</p> <p>Customized: includes user-defined metrics.</p> <p>Precise Status: includes metrics that alert to the near-critical or critical status of the installed Precise environment.</p>
<b>module</b>	A session identifier. In Oracle it contains the value of MODULE column in V\$SESSION table. In DB2 it contains the command name of non-SQL statements or the package name for SQL statements.
<b>near-critical status</b>	In Alerts, a status indicating that the value of the sampled metric has exceeded the defined near-critical threshold. A near-critical status is indicated by a yellow bullet.
<b>network time</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the time spent on network activity from the server side perspective. This includes the time to read the request from the network and the network time to send the response back to the client.
<b>node</b>	<p>See <a href="#">Framework node</a>.</p> <p>Note: when creating a new installation from DVD, it would be called "Framework." In the UI screens (columns in tables, choosing a system for a new environment etc), we would call them "Nodes." For example: choose a node for the new environment.</p> <p>When adding a new system within AdminPoint, it would be called a "Framework node".</p>
<b>packaged application</b>	<p>An application that is created and/or maintained by a third party and is not custom-built to one's specific needs. The following packaged applications have special treatment by Precise: SAP, Oracle Applications, PeopleSoft, and Siebel. They are harder to modify because the application code is either not available or hard to understand.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">ERP Extension</a>.</p>
<b>page size</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the amount of data loaded from the server to display the page.
<b>page views</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the number of Web pages viewed at a specific Web site during a selected time period.
<b>parent metric</b>	<p>In Alerts, a joining of several child metrics. Each time a parent metric samples, it gathers data from a set of child metrics and presents it as a single metric query. The individual child metric values are displayed on the Thresholds tab of the Properties dialog box in Alerts.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">submetric</a>.</p>
<b>performance counter</b>	In SQL Server, a Windows performance counter as reported by the operating system. In Oracle, an instance level statistic as gathered from some Oracle V\$ views. In Sybase, a sysmonitors counter collected by Sybase. In Web, an operating system or a Web server performance counter.
<b>PMDB</b>	The Precise data warehouse of performance and availability data. It can be hosted on an Oracle or SQL Server database.
<b>portal server</b>	An application server for Web-based applications that commonly provide personalization, single sign-on, and content aggregation from different sources and that host the presentation layer of Information Systems. Aggregation is the action of integrating content from different sources within a Web page. A portal may have sophisticated personalization features to provide customized content to users. Portal pages may have a different set of portlets creating content for different users.
<b>portlet</b>	A Java-based Web component, managed by a portlet container, that processes requests and generates dynamic content. Portlets are used by portals as pluggable user interface components that provide a presentation layer to Information Systems.
<b>Precise deployment</b>	An independent Precise system. It contains and manages various agent types and provides centralized monitoring and administration. A Precise deployment may contain multiple framework nodes. One of them is defined as the main framework node and it manages all other nodes of the Precise deployment.
<b>Precise FocalPoint</b>	See <a href="#">Precise FocalPoint agent</a> .
<b>Precise FocalPoint agent</b>	An agent that manages all agents in a single Precise deployment. Additional product FocalPoint agents manage specific technologies and resources.
<b>Precise Proxy agent</b>	When multiple Framework Nodes are managed by a single Precise deployment, the Precise FocalPoint agent manages all of the agents of the main Framework node, while every other framework node has a Precise Proxy agent to manage all its agents.
<b>Precise_root</b>	This is the term used in a path for the Precise installation directory. The terms <code>&lt;i3_root&gt;</code> or <code>i3 root</code> can appear in text too.

<b>program</b>	<p>A session identifier in Oracle, DB2, SQL Server, Sybase, Insight, and Alerts. A program as sampled, for example, by the SQL Server Collector, is the name of the executable that connects to the database. Applications that do not set the application name have N/A as program. When a SAP extension is installed, the SAP transaction overrides the program, and it may change during the application's lifetime. When a Siebel extension is installed, the Siebel views override the program, and it may change during the application's lifetime. In Insight, program is the name of an executable as recognized by the operating system. If an executable is invoked from a script (a batch or a shell), the script is displayed as the command entity. In Alerts, program is part of the customized metrics definition and is the name of the executable or stored procedure executed in the database that runs when the metric is sampled. In action definitions, program is the name of the executable that will run if the metric exceeds its threshold.</p>
<b>progress</b>	<p>In Alerts, the management state of a metric for which an alert has been raised. The following statuses exist:</p> <p>Open: An alert is raised.</p> <p>Investigated: The alert is taken care of.</p> <p>Closed: The problem has been solved.</p>
<b>Proxy FocalPoint</b>	See <a href="#">Precise Proxy agent</a>
<b>recommended index</b>	<p>In SQL Server, a function that uses the Microsoft Index Tuning Wizard to recommend on adding indexes or statistics for a selected statement, batch, or table. Based on the results of this function, the Optimizer will choose a better access plan and make the respective statement or batch perform better. For statements and batches, recommendations are based on the content of the statement or batch. For tables, recommendations are based on all the statements that are stored in the PMDB, are executed during the selected time period, and have an average duration time greater than the value defined in the registry (where 0 is the default).</p> <p>See also <a href="#">advice</a>.</p>
<b>related SQL</b>	<p>In Oracle, a generated statement that uses alternative syntax to access the database in different ways and returns the same output as the original statement.</p>
<b>relative frequency</b>	<p>Number of contributor invocations per entry point. For example, if a service request calls three methods each time it is invoked, the Relative Frequency for the method is three invocations per service request execution. Similarly, if a service request calls one method every other time it is invoked (half of the time), the Relative Frequency for the method is 0.5 invocations per service request execution.</p>
<b>rendering time</b>	<p>In Web, a counter that keeps track of the time that it takes for a Web page to be loaded from the moment the first byte arrives until the Web page is fully loaded or the user interrupts or abandons the loading process.</p>
<b>report</b>	<p>A collection of queries, programming code, and layout settings that Report Manager executes to generate graphical results like tables and charts.</p>
<b>Report Manager</b>	<p>Uses historical information to identify problematic conditions, track long-term performance, volume trends and patterns, view availability problems over long periods of time and on different levels, compare the performance of similar systems, correlate between performance metrics of different products, assist in capacity planning, and generate demand-driven, user-defined reports.</p>
<b>Report Manager FocalPoint</b>	<p>An agent that examines the PMDB tables to produce scheduled performance reports.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">PMDB</a>.</p>
<b>report parameter</b>	<p>In Report Manager, a keyword used in a report. Its value is set during the report execution. A parameter's value can be updated either permanently or for the current execution only.</p>
<b>report property</b>	<p>In Report Manager, the attributes that define a specific report, consisting of report parameters and scheduling information.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">report parameter</a>.</p>
<b>request</b>	<p>In Web, a counter that keeps track of the number of HTTP requests sent for a viewed entity. <b>request</b></p>
<b>error</b>	<p>In Web, a counter that keeps track of the percentage of requests completed with an HTTP error.</p>
<b>sampling</b>	<p>In Alerts, the process during which a metric queries a Precise product for a specific instance, retrieves values, and calculates the metric's alert level.</p>
<b>sampling base</b>	<p>In Alerts, the start time of a scheduled sampling process (by default Sunday, 00:00 AM).</p>
<b>sampling period</b>	<p>In specific Alerts metrics, the time frame during which statistical data is returned from other Precise products. Such a metric is for example Oracle's General Behavior metric, which returns database behavior for a certain period of time.</p>

<b>sampling rate</b>	In Alerts, the frequency of a metric's regular sampling schedule. The sampling rate is measured in minutes.
<b>Savvy</b>	An Insight agent that collects AppTier-specific performance data.
<b>scalability</b>	A system's ability to withstand load. For example, positive scalability means that the system continues to function properly even when it is called upon to service a larger number of users.
<b>schema changes</b>	In Oracle and SQL Server, a process that captures schema changes and saves them in the PMDB. In SQL Server, instance configuration parameters and database option changes are also captured.
<b>Script Installer</b>	A component of Precise Agent Installer that enables adding a small JavaScript script, also known as a Web browser-side agent, to the Web pages of your Web site.
<b>server</b>	Also called a host machine or server machine. The combination of a computer and associated operating system software that is accessed by multiple clients to perform requested functions and typically returns results to the clients.
<b>server-side collection</b>	In Web, the collecting of performance data from the Web server instance through the Web server agent.
<b>service + network time</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the service and network time, including the total amount of time the request took to reach the server.
<b>Service Level Agreement</b>	See <a href="#">SLA (Service Level Agreement)</a> .
<b>service time</b>	In Web and SmartLink, the time elapsed from when a request is received by the server to the time a response is sent back to the computer that made that request. The service time is measured on the server side. In J2EE, the time it takes an invocation to complete execution. In other words, service time is the average length of time between the start time and end time of a Java method execution. For example, the SQL service time is the time it takes the JDBC method executing the SQL statement to be completed. The service time includes CPU and wait time. The service times are reported in the interval in which they complete execution. Though a contributor's average service time may be very small, the contributor may be called many times. As a result, a contributor's overall contribution to performance may be large even though its average service time is low.
<b>servlet</b>	A class that is loaded only once and for which the application server uses multithreading to process requests. The servlet generates an HTML page that is sent back to the Web browser.
<b>size</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the bytes sent and received.
<b>SLA (Service Level Agreement)</b>	A formal definition of an information system's performance goals. Within Precise, an SLA consists of clauses corresponding to various system activities. Once a system's SLA is defined, its SLA compliance can be analyzed, and breaches can be isolated to identify their causes.
<b>SmartLink</b>	In Insight, a component that provides transactive, correlated information across AppTiers from the user's perspective. Insight SmartLink functions in PeopleSoft and Web applications environments.
<b>SmarTune</b>	In Oracle, SQL Server, and .NET, an algorithm that analyzes performance metrics, identifies and ranks potential problem areas, and provides advice for correcting the problems.
<b>socket</b>	An I/O abstraction layer that enables processes to communicate with each other, regardless of whether they are on the same server. Sockets are bi-directional FIFO pipes that look like regular file I/O to the developer with the abstraction layer handling all of the low-level communication details.
<b>StartPoint</b>	The opening page of Precise. It provides a quick overview of the environment status and links to launch any of the Precise products.
<b>Statistics workspace</b>	In Oracle, DB2, SQL Server, Sybase, J2EE, and Web this workspace presents instance level statistics such as hit ratios, utilization, JMX metrics, logging, and more.
<b>submetric</b>	Also called child metric. In Alerts, the subquery of a parent metric. A child metric gathers its own data and combines it with the data gathered by other child metrics to form the result of the parent metric. Each child metric has its own thresholds and may be enabled or disabled individually. See also <a href="#">parent metric</a> .
<b>summary table</b>	A container that stores the information collected by the Precise agents and loads it into the PMDB. Summary tables store the same data at different levels of granularity: time slice, hourly, daily, weekly, and monthly. By storing data in multiple summary tables, Precise can present a detailed view and progressively higher-level views of the same data. Summary tables are particularly useful for data aging. A data purging policy can be implemented for each summary table so that detailed data is retained for short-term historical analyses while more summarized data is used for long-term analyses and trending.

<b>technology</b>	A technology identifies the monitored object. For example, Oracle, SQL Server, Sybase, and DB2 are different technologies, while all Web servers (such as: Apache, IIS, and WebSphere) are defined as a single Web technology. A single monitored object can be monitored by two different technology's Collectors. For example, WebLogic server can be monitored by both a Web Collector and a J2EE Collector.
<b>throughput</b>	The number of average completions per second that are observed during an interval.
<b>time slice</b>	<p>A unit used to break up long sessions into smaller time periods. The length of a time slice is preset and cannot be changed. It represents the maximum time that passes before the data collected can be displayed. For example, if the length of a time slice is 15 minutes, the collection is only updated at 15-minute intervals.</p> <p>The length of a time slice is different for each technology: In Oracle, SQL Server, Sybase, DB2, Web, .NET, MQ, Tuxedo, Network, and OS, a time slice is 15 minutes. In J2EE and SmartLink, a time slice is either 30 seconds or 5 minutes. In Precise for SAP, a time slice is 5 minutes.</p> <p>See also <a href="#">collector slice size</a>.</p>
<b>URI (Uniform Resource Identifier)</b>	The relative path to a resource after the location (network node) is found.
<b>URL mapping</b>	In Web, a function that defines rules that map URLs (Uniform Resource Locators) with dynamic parameters originating from a specific domain to a format that identifies the Web pages and prevents them from having different URLs.
<b>Web client browser-side</b>	In Web, the gathering of performance data from the browser running on the desktop of the Web application's user, through the static or dynamic instrumentation of Web pages.
<b>Web server</b>	A program that receives client requests for Web pages, retrieves the static pages and/or issues a request for dynamic page creation to an application server, and sends the pages to the client. In Web, a computer that delivers (serves up) Web pages. Every Web server has an IP address and possibly a domain name.
<b>work time</b>	The time spent in the specific entity excluding time spent by called (other) entities. In J2EE, work time of a method is calculated as the service time of that method minus the service time of the methods it invoked.
<b>work type</b>	In Web, a counter that keeps track of the type of the Web instance, such as Web, PeopleSoft, SAP, or Siebel.
<b>workspace</b>	A display unit in Precise products. All workspaces display data from different perspectives. For example, in Oracle, SQL Server, and Sybase, the Current workspace shows information on the sessions currently active in an application, and the Objects workspace displays information on Oracle or SQL Server database objects that can be used to understand relationships and associations between database schema objects.
